Plan and carry out one or more group projects such as safety, health, conservation of natural resources (such as wildlife conservation, Acres for Wildlife or soil conservation), recreation, people-to-people, emergency preparedness, citizenship, ecology, pollution control, or other areas. Give a brief summary of work done. Only one may be counted.
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2. Members must present one or more demonstration or illustrated talks in a county 4-H Day.

4. Three or more 4-H'ers participate in a county or district judging school or contest.
5. Have an activity (display, poster, event, project) promoting some phase of $4-\mathrm{H}$ during National 4-H Week.
$\qquad$ 6. Have a booth or banner at the County Fair or a county show, promoting some phase of 4-H work.
7. Provide three feature stories and ten or more news stories. Or any combination thereof, for publication on project work, club meetings or group projects.
8. A majority of club's activities are planned by the members. Indicate how planned: $\qquad$
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III. In addition to the above, each club must complete 15 of the following. You can also count any of the remaining 2 options listed in item II.
_ 1. Present a radio or TV program.
2. Project meetings held in a majority of projects in which four are enrolled.
_ 3. Hold a parent's night meeting or program.
4. Have a achievement program at a regular or special $4-\mathrm{H}$ meeting to bring the accomplishments of 4-H'ers to the attention of the people in the area.
_ 5. Hold a club project tour or local community fair.
_ 6. One or more project leaders in the club have "individual 4-H'ers evaluation" conferences with a majority of 4-H'er in his or her group.
$\qquad$ 7. Maintain or increase the number of 4-H'ers in the group.
$\qquad$ 8. Junior Leaders assist project leaders at two or more project meetings.
$\qquad$ 9. A majority of $4-\mathrm{H}$ members will participate in skits they develop to present at their meetings, which will show they understand how to use Robert's Rules of Order.
_ 10. Present a program to explain and promote 4-H at one or more schools or other locations.
_ 11. Have an exchange meeting or other event with another 4-H group or club in your county or in another county.

_ 22. Provide a junior leader or superintendent at the county fair.
__ 23. Have 4-H'er in two or more county events not included in any other option guideline such as Fashion Revue, Tractor Operation Contest, Dog Show, Spring Show, or other similar events.
__ 24. Have some exhibits from your club at the Sunflower State Expo or the Kansas State Fair.
_ 25. Have 4-H'ers participate in the Sunflower State Expo or the Kansas State Fair in ways other than exhibiting project work including, but not limited to, new games, informal demonstration and illustrated talks, informal modeling, judging, acting as hosts, participating in Arts-In or Puppet Shows.
__ 26. Have one or more 4-H'ers attend a training meeting for camp counselors, and assist with the day or county camp.
27. Have a family in your club serve as a host to IFYE or LABO delegate, or having a family member as an IFYE or LABO delegate.
